The Person Behind the Number

Countless hours are spent analyzing quality measure (QM) data. How much of that time is spent focusing on the person behind the number? During this session, you'll take a person-centered approach to quality improvement by not only understanding how the MDS-based measures are calculated, but more importantly, who makes up that measure. Utilizing the five whys, you will focus on identifying why the person is included in the measure to target improvement efforts that focus on the resident rather than the numbers. Following this session, you'll be able to:

- Identify the criteria for inclusion in the numerator and denominator for MDS-based measures found on the facility QM report
- List covariates and exclusions used in the calculation of the MDS-based measures found on the facility QM report
- Recall how to conduct root cause analysis using the five whys to identify areas for improvement in the care of residents triggering for quality measures
- Develop a plan for person-centered interventions based on quality measure analysis

Practical Strategies for Managing Behavioral Health Needs of Nursing Home Residents

Residents with serious mental illnesses and substance use disorders continue to be admitted to nursing homes, yet staff often lack skills and confidence in meeting their needs. Facility staff are focused on appropriate reductions in antipsychotics and psychotropic medications but are also concerned about managing residents' symptoms after dose reduction. The speaker will focus on practical nonpharmacological approaches to meeting the behavioral health needs of residents. Additionally, the speaker will provide an overview of the Center of Excellence for Behavioral Health in Nursing Facilities (COE-NF), a federally funded center that provides training, resources, and technical assistance to nursing facility staff to build capacity for meeting the needs of residents with behavioral health conditions. - Recognize available resources to assist with planning effective nonpharmacological interventions
- Describe the COE-NF purpose, audience, types of services, and how to access them

Health Literacy: It's More Than a Yes or No Question

Health literacy has been a focus in healthcare for many years, but with its addition to the MDS this year, it is now likely to be a part of your survey process and is taking new focus in the long-term care setting. The speaker will identify the key areas that should be addressed in your systems and approach to care, including documents and education that can be modified to meet your resident's needs for improved health, increased discharge success, and improved resident satisfaction. Discussion will also highlight ways that your rehab team can assist your interdisciplinary team with education and training needs, care planning for health literacy, and survey preparation. Significant progress to address and correct widespread managed care denials for coverage and payment was included in the FY 2024 Medicare Advantage final rule, which was fully implemented on Jan. 1, 2024. Changes require Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) to follow traditional Medicare coverage guidelines when making medical necessity determinations, limit prior authorization policies, and include the treating provider's recommendation for medical necessity determination. During this session, you will learn how to hold managed care insurers accountable to these new rules. Following this session, you'll be able to:

Significant Change in Status: Quality Measures/Staffing Without Section G

With the removal of section G from MDS 3.0 v1.18.11, the residual implications are far reaching. CMS memo QSO-23-21-NH describes these significant changes. Along with this memo, CMS released updated versions of the *Five-Star Users' Guide* and the *Quality Measures User's Manual* detailing the specific technical specifications to the quality measures and staffing star calculations. The speaker will break these revisions apart so you will walk away with a better understanding of what to expect as these changes take effect. Following this session, you'll be able to:

The Facility Assessment is not a new requirement and has been around since the State Operations Manual Appendix PP update in 2017. CMS expects this assessment to capture the operation of a facility and function as a guide for the type of services rendered based on resident need. A list of components of the Facility Assessment includes identifying types of residents, staff training needs, and resources for care delivery including emergencies. This document is more than a paper exercise and should have a process of revision as the culture, resident population, staffing, and practices in your facility change. During this session, the speakers will help you create the Facility Assessment as the roadmap to your destination in quality care. Following this session, you'll be able to:

- Describe the key components of the Facility Assessment

Understanding the Process for Beneficiary Notices and Physician Certifications

Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) regulations require residents receiving Medicare Part A or Part B services be given notices in writing when these services are discontinuing. Another CMS regulation requires the signing of the Physician Certification to support the skilled need of the resident under Medicare and also allows the nursing home to get paid for that skilled service. The scenarios for giving the beneficiary notices can be confusing and an error in the process can have a significant impact on the nursing home. Meanwhile, an error in completing the Physician Certification can also have a damaging financial impact on the nursing home. Following this session, you'll be able to:

ICD-10-CM Coding Basics

ICD-10-CM coding accuracy is required for billing under the Patient-Driven Payment Model (PDPM), MDS coding, accurate billing, and to correctly enter diagnoses in resident records at the highest degree of specificity documented by the resident's physician/extender. One of the important functions of the MDS assessment is to generate an updated, accurate picture of the resident's current health status, which includes accurate ICD-10-CM coding. Nurses do not learn ICD-10-CM coding during formal nursing training but are required to identify active diagnoses for the residents. The speaker will provide basics of ICD-10-CM and identify how diagnosis codes impact PDPM, billing, Quality Measures, and MDS accuracy. Following this session, you'll be able to:

- State the correct process for determining the ICD-10 code from the physician's documented diagnoses


